


DISEASE 101: Sudan Ebolavirus



What is Ebolavirus?

- Ebola virus disease is known as a **hemorrhagic fever.**
- It can disrupt the body's clotting system and lead to internal bleeding.

*Only type of ebolavirus with approved vaccine.

There are **no approved vaccines** or treatments for Sudan ebolavirus disease.

There have been **8 outbreaks** of the Sudan ebolavirus disease.

Disease Transmission




INITIAL CONTACT

The disease is transmitted to humans by infected animals, including fruit bats.

SECONDARY SPREAD

In humans, it can spread through close personal contact or contact with bodily fluids.
